

Verbs followed by an infinitive

Some verbs are often followed by the **to + verb** form of another verb. Verbs like **need**, **try**, **start** are all often followed by **to + verb**.

helping verb	to + infinitive
I need	to study.
I try	to stay healthy.



Verbs followed by an infinitive

■ The helping verb can be in the **simple** or **continuous** form.

Helping verb	to + infinitive	object
l am starting	to change	my mind.
I am hoping	to see	my friend.
I hope	to change	the world.

Verbs followed by gerunds

- The **verb + ing** form is called a gerund
 - Some helping verbs, like **enjoy**, **dislike**, and **stop**, are often followed by gerunds.

l enjoy	helping my friends.
I dislike	eating cheese.
Please stop	washing those dishes.



Verbs followed by gerunds and infinitives

- Some verbs can be followed by a gerund or an infinitive
 - Verbs such as **hate**, **love**, **like**, and **prefer** can take a **gerund** or an **infinitive**, and the meaning of the sentence does not change much

Infinitive	Gerund
I hate to run.	I hate running .
I like to call my friends.	I like calling my friends.
I love to bake cookies.	I love baking cookies.
l prefer to play football.	I prefer playing football.
