

We use **going to** to talk about our future plans. We are sure and we made the decision before we speak.





Predictions with going to

We also use **going to** when we make predictions. This is when we have evidence for our prediction.


Oh! Look at those black clouds!	Oh no! It is going to rain.
The blue team is playing very well today.	Yes. I think they are going to win the match.
Did you drink a lot of coffee this evening?	Yes, it is going to be difficult to go to sleep.



Present continuous vs. going to

Compare the **present continuous** and the future with **going to**.

Present continuous	Future with going to
He is going to school now.	He is going to go to school tomorrow.
We are eating dinner at the moment.	We are going to eat dinner later.
They are watching a film now.	They are going to watch a film this evening.






