

Review of questions in the present

- To ask questions in the **present simple**, use the helping verb **do** (or **does** in the third person singular)
- You can also use question words (for example, what, why, where) to make questions

Statement	Question
You like snacks.	Do you like snacks?
She celebrates Easter.	Does she celebrate Easter?
The party is at 9 oʻclock.	What time is the party?
The wedding is in London.	Where is the wedding?



Switch places: present continuous and modal verbs

- There are two cases where the **verb** needs to switch places with the **subject**:
 - When asking questions using the **present continuous**
 - When asking questions using a **modal verb**, like the verb **can**
- See some examples below:

Statement	Question
You are celebrating.	Are you celebrating?
You are drinking wine.	Are you drinking wine?
We can go to the party.	Can we go to the party?
They can play the piano.	Can they play the piano?



Asking questions in the past tense

- To ask questions in the past, use **did** (the past form of **to do**) + the main form of the verb
- Make the question negative by using didn't (did + not)

Statement	Question
You saw a movie last night.	Did you see a movie last night?
She drank a glass of wine.	Did she drink a glass of wine?
We did not travel last summer.	Didn't we travel last summer?



Asking questions in the past tense

- Question words (what, why, where, how, when) always go first, followed by the main verb and the subject.
 - Use **was** and **were** (the past forms of **to be**) in past questions.

How	did you cook	this pasta?
Where	did you go	on holiday?
Why	did you invite	her to the party?
When	was your brother	at the party?
Why	were you	late?



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Using the present continuous for future plans



In English, we often use the **present continuous** tense to **talk about the future**. This is a very common way to talk about plans for the near future using the present continuous tense, that you already know.

The present continuous is combined with a future time phrase to give it a meaning in the future. Here are some common examples.

Present continuous	Future time phrase
What are you doing	this weekend?
Where are they going	on holidays next summer?
What are we eating	for dinner tonight?
How is he travelling	to Poland tomorrow?
What time are you going	to get the bus in the morning?
