
Comparative adjectives

- Comparative adjectives are used to compare differences between two things.
- When you are comparing things, *than* is placed after the comparative adjective. The construction is as follows:


Noun (subject) + verb + comparative adjective + than + noun (object)

For example:


- My cat is cuter than yours.
- George is **taller than** Sally.




Your new apartment is really big.




My apartment is **small**.



Your apartment is **bright**.



My apartment is dark.



I don't hear any traffic and it is **quiet**.



Forming comparatives

For short words, we add **-er** to mean **more**.

adjective	comparative
bright	bright er
dark	dark er
small	small er
big	bigg er

Use more

- For longer words, we use **more** and we don't add **-er**. We add the word **more** before the adjective to make it comparative.
- This is normally when the adjective has **three or more syllables**.

adjective	comparative
expensive	more expensive
traditional	more traditional
contemporary	more contemporary

far	\rightarrow	further
